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Symbols in *Lord of the Flies* and Their Identities

The key symbols in *Lord of the Flies* by William Golding have their own identities.

The Island acts as an influence to the characters. They characters even question it on page 52 "'As if it wasn't a good island.'". This implies an evil coming from the island. The characters in The Lord of the Flies fear this unknown thing. Whether that is the beast the island or eachother Fear is a big theme. The island gives this fear to them especially Jack. "'...as if you're not hunting, but---being hunted, ...'" (p. 53). The characters refer to it as a feeling. The island is all they had and even that is bringing fear and uncomfort.

Overall, these symbols can create either fear or comfort. If that comfort shatters, like the conch, then fear will take over. Likewise, if your fear is drained you will feel comfortable and content.
