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Jack and Ralph's Leadership Roles

William Golding makes Jack and Ralph both controversial strong leaders in The Lord of the Flies. Ralph and Jack are extremely different from each other in the ways they think, lead and fight. Throughout the book, the brotherly relationship between Ralph and Jack slowly develops into a relationship of betrayal and violence. Ralph thinks on a mature level by learning from past mistakes, while Jack focuses on the fun in life. This leads to many bloody conflicts between the two omnipotent leaders and their groups.

Ralph possess a very specific way of leading and solving problems. Ralph throughout the book acts like the older brother because he is older and wiser. The majority of the boys vote for Ralph to be the leader instead of Jack. Ralph becomes a leader not because he is very qualified but simply because of his charismatic energy interests people. Throughout the novel Lord of The Flies, Ralph tries to create a society based on survival. He is reassuring when he speaks and many of his followers find it calming.
